


AMOUNT DONATED TO VETERANS PER STATE DURING FISCAL YEAR 2023

Health & Comfort Program


DVNF's Health & Comfort Kits have been a lifeline for veterans struggling to meet their basic needs. In 2023, we distributed 18,000 Health & Comfort Kits to veterans across the country. Each kit includes essential items such as hygiene products, clothing, and blankets. These kits ensures that veterans have the necessities to maintain their health and dignity. For many, these kits have been the first step toward reclaiming their lives.



HEALTH AND COMFORT

Through our Health and Comfort program DVNF distributes our signature Comfort Kits to struggling veterans throughout the country. The contents of our Comfort Kits vary based on our inventory; however, we always strive to include quality and full-sized items such as shampoo, conditioner, soap, a toothbrush, toothpaste, and other hygiene items. DVNF has also recently created our own signature Women's Kits. These kits were created to supplement our Comfort Kits and make sure our too often overlooked female veterans have the personal care items they truly need.

In 2023, the Foundation served approximately 14,800 Veterans and their families through 35 organizations across the nation. This resulted in an investment of \$3,900,000+ to aid our nation's struggling veterans.

Capacity Building Grants Program

To help Veterans across the nation dealing with wounds sustained during their service, the Foundation provides services to organizations helping these veterans with Mental and Physical wellness, Housing and Homelessness and Employment.

The Foundation's programs served 47 organizations in 25 states. An investment of \$860,000 serving more than 27,900 veterans and their families.

Of these organizations, 9 provided Housing and Homelessness services and 38 provided mental and physical wellness services.


Warriors on the Way

GRANTS TO PROVIDE STABILITY (GPS) PROGRAM

Financial stability is critical for veterans transitioning back into civilian life. The GPS Program provided over \$140,000 in grants to 159 veterans in 2023, helping them avoid crises such as eviction, utility shutoffs, and other financial hardships. These grants have been a crucial safety net, allowing veterans to focus on rebuilding their lives without the constant fear of financial collapse.

I was worried that the home I worked so hard to get would be taken from me, or that my credit, which took years to build, would suffer another serious hit. The biggest impact was the relief I felt, knowing that someone had my back and the weight was lifted off my shoulders."

Now, I won't lose my car, which is my lifeline. I'm starting school to earn my Bachelor's in Animal-Assisted Therapy and plan to continue on to get my Master's in Social Work. My goal is to help other veterans by creating and administering Equine Therapy programs."

ADDRESSING THE MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS: A CALL TO ACTION

The United States faces a silent crisis—a profound mental health challenge that affects countless lives. Among those most affected are our veterans, first responders, and their families, who bear the invisible scars of service and often struggle with mental health issues. In response to this national crisis, the Disabled Veterans National Foundation (DVNF) has stepped forward to provide vital assistance.

THE WISSION PROGRAM

Total Participants: 2,883 veterans, first responders, and family members have registered for the program.

Active Engagement: Currently, 1,250 participants are actively enhancing their mental health. **Branch Breakdown:**



DVNF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



Post-COVID-19 many people were in need of additional assistance. To respond to this need, the Foundation began hosting an annual Gran-N-Go to help local veterans. The Foundation staff provided comfort kits, gift cards, and groceries to each participant. In 2023, The Grab-N-Go was sponsored by The Padre Pio Foundation and was held in Newington, Connecticut at the Newington VA. DVNF served 450 Veterans and their families on May 24, 2023.



GRAB N' GO EVENT

DVNF's Grab N' Go events have become a critical resource for veterans in need of immediate support. In 2023, we hosted one such event in collaboration with The Padre Pio Foundation of America at the Newington VA Medical Center. This event reached 450 homeless and low-income veterans in the Newington/Hartford, Connecticut area, providing them with a complimentary meal, health and comfort kits, resource binders, and grocery store gift cards. These efforts ensured that veterans had access to basic necessities without delay.

The DVNF's Resource Fair served approximately 229 veterans, exceeding the previous year's count of 200. The fair provided:






